## Looking Back at the Year 2020 JARDIN DE NIÑOS DAVID LYNCH, MEXICO



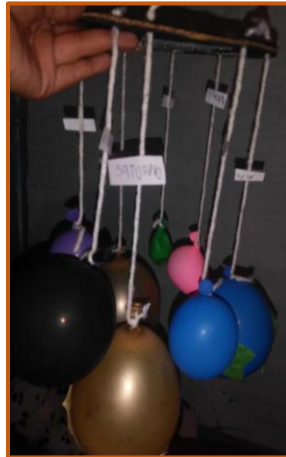

Gym class: This is beneficial for the physical and mental development.



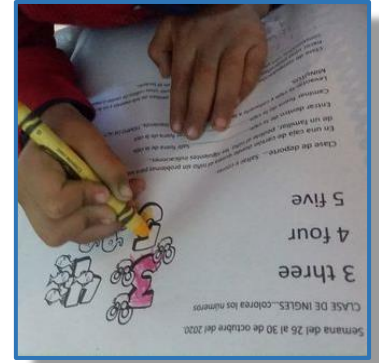
